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## Basic Two-Two Twill

Weaving over two loops and then under two loops, shifting over by one loop on each row, produces a smooth, slightly puffy fabric.

## Twill Nine Block

Combining two-two twill weaving with threading that features a central stripe produces a pattern with a mix of solid blocks and diagonal stripes.

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## Houndstooth Twill

Combining a basic two-two twill weave with alternating color threading produces a repeating pattern of jagged shapes called houndstooth.

A classic pattern, added to our charts April 2022.

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## Two-Two Twill Chevrons

Weaving over two loops and then under two loops, shifting over by one loop on each row, produces a smooth, slightly puffy fabric.



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## Zig Zag Twill

Basic twill zigzags; if you are new to twill patterns, this is a nice way to ease yourself in. Evenlydstributed floats create a puffy thickness that provides extra protection for heavy hot pots.

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## Back and Forth Twill

Tiny twill zigzags. When removed from the loom, adjacent warps bunch up to form narrow vertical ribs.

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## Twill Diamond

Weaving over two loops and then under two loops, shifting over by one loop on each row, produces a smooth, slightly puffy fabric.

Charted April 2022.



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Repeatedly reversing the direction of the twill produces a series of closely-set diamonds.

## Herringbone Twill

A two-two twill with alternating diagonals, herringbone is a traditional weaving pattern named for the rows of thin bones found in fish.


## Asymmetric Herringbone

A two-two twill with alternating diagonals, herringbone is a traditional weaving pattern named for the rows of thin bones found in fish.

Inspired by Coppergate fragment 1306.


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## Leaning Tower Twill

A simple 2-2 twill staggers slightly as it changes direction, producing stripes that shift slowly across the pattern in a most unexpected way.

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## Kreuzköper

With a German name meaning "cross twill," this is a two-two twill with broken chevrons reversing every two rows.

This weave was common throughout northern Europe during the early medieval period.

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## Cross Breeze

The flexibility and substance of the over-2/under-2 twill fabric provides a safe grip on hot pots while a long diagonal of under- 3 twills creates a natural

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## Rick Rack

The consistent diagonal $2 / 2$ twill fabric is interrupted by a perpendicular ridge.

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## Twill Step Diamond

This two-two twill step pattern changes direction as it crosses the center line, folding back on itself to form a zigzag diamond.

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## Chladni Wave Plate

A combintation of straight lines and diagonal steps forms a enclosed form, with a striking cross on the other side.

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## Four-Four Twill

Pulls up even more than two-two twill, creating a smaller potholder with remarkably thick fabric.

## Four-Four Twill Steps

Pulls up even more than two-two twill, creating a smaller potholder with remarkably thick fabric.


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## Four-Four Twill Fletching

As with other four-four twills, this pulls up dramatically when removed from the loom, creating a smaller potholder with remarkably thick fabric.

The alternating bands of color produce a pattern reminiscent of fletching, the feathers used to make arrows fly straight.

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## Baskerville Houndstooth

As with other four-four twills, this pulls up dramatically when removed from the loom, creating a smaller potholder with remarkably thick fabric.

The alternating bands of color produce a pattern reminiscent of traditional houndstooth, but at an unusually large scale.

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## Two-One Chevron Twill

Examples of $2 / 1$ chevron twill are found woven from linen in 7th-century Britain and from wool from 8th-century Germany.

## Rippenköper

Rippenköper (German for "ribbed twill") alternates narrow bands of weft-faced and warp-faced twill.

Rippenköper was used for fancy fabrics in southern Geremany during the early middle ages, mostly of two-one twill alternating every three rows, but sometimes with other widths.

A repeating weave of over- $2 /$ under- 1 combined with three alternating colors produces a series of lines.

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## Quad-Color Twill Stripes

Straight lines are produced by combining $3 / 1$ twill with a four-color threading cycle in warp and weft.

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## Egyptian Rippenköper

Rippenköper (German for "ribbed twill") alternates narrow bands of weft-faced and warp-faced twill.

Rippenköper has been found in Roman-era
Egyptian fabrics, most often in three-one twill.



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## Anchor Chains

A row of parallel chains ride above the background, mirrored by another set on the other side.

The weft chains (shown as dark in this chart) form a ridge over the flat warp, creating a substantial wave and producing an extra-thick fabric.

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## Three-Three Shift Twill

A modified $3 / 3$ twill that shifts over two loops on each row rather than one.

Collapses when taken off the loom so that each side of the fabric shows only alternate warp loops.


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Magical Three-Three Twill
A modified 3/3 twill that shifts over two loops on each row rather than one.

Collapses when taken off the loom so that each side of the fabric shows only alternate warp loops.


An original creation first charted in June 2022.


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## Magical Newsprint

An alternating weaving pattern of $2 / 2 / 1 / 1$. Repeats every three rows and six columns.

Collapses when taken off the loom so that each side of the fabric shows only alternate warp loops.


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## Three-Three Offset Twill

This three-three weave has alternate rows offset by two or three loops, producing a pattern of nested $Z$ shapes - but when removed from the loom, it collapses in itself, with much of the warp hidden behind the weft facing, and alternating wide wales divided by distinct grooves.



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## Four-Four Shift Twill

A modified $4 / 4$ twill that shifts over three loops on each row rather than one.

When removed from the loom, the weft rises to the surface on each side, hiding much of the warp loops, which peek through only once every six rows.



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## Double-Faced Twill

A 3/1 twill and a $1 / 3$ twill are woven simultaneously and collapse to produce a double-sided fabric..

Each peg of your loom will get two loops stacked on it - a lower one in $1 / 3$ twill (dark color in this chart) and an upper one in $3 / 1$ twill (light color).

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## Three-One Satin

A 3/1 weaving pattern covers the fabric with long parallel floats without creating diagonal wales.

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## Four-One Satin

A 4/1 weaving pattern covers the fabric with long parallel floats.




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## Traveling Twill

A repeating cycle of 2-2-2-1-1-1 produces angled stripes of uneaven widths.

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## Angled Twill Fade

A spectrum of twills steps in angled bands from $4 / 1$ through $3 / 2$ and $2 / 3$ to $1 / 4$.

The result is flexible and flat despite the changes in weave.

## Tri-Color Chevrons

A repeating weave of $3 / 1 / 1 / 1 / 1 / 2$ combines with three alternating colors to make a series of $V$ shapes.

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## Beaded Twill

Alternating between two-one twill and two-two-one-one produces a grid of small and large squares on each side.

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## Barleycorn

Alternating small and large squares separated by long diagonals.

## Twilled Hopsack

An angled series of over-two floats is framed by alternating one- and three-floats to produce the appearance of an angled weave.

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## Separated Twill Crosses

Alternating rows of $3 / 1$ and $1 / 1$ yield a sprinkling of dimpled crosses on the front and puffy ridges on the other.
